And the 2011 Recycler of the Year-Lifetime Achievement Award goes to...

Lynn Leopold!

Lynn was honored at the New York State Association for Reduction, Reuse, and Recycling (NYSAR3) annual conference in November.

Lynn retired over ten years ago after serving as the Tompkins County Recycling Specialist for over two decades, but has continued in recycling and waste reduction efforts throughout her retirement.

She was an early leader of the recycling movement in New York State and successfully encouraged the City of Ithaca to implement one of the first residential curbside recycling programs in the 1980s. Lynn was extremely knowledgeable about the future possibilities for recycling. Her contributions include developing County recycling initiatives, creating education materials for recycling, establishing recycling guidelines for businesses, and establishing municipal recycling drop-off areas during the implementation of the countywide trash tag policy. While working with Tompkins County Solid Waste Management Division (TCSWMD), her greatest strength was educating residents and businesses about how to recycle. Lynn was responsible for one of the first waste assessment projects with business and institutions and developed a business recycling manual.

Lynn's efforts have contributed to Tompkins County's achievement of a waste diversion rate of almost 60% and a successful countywide curbside recycling program since 1991.

Christmas Tree Safety

Whether your Christmas tree is live or artificial, precautions must be followed to ensure safety for you and your family.

Below are some safety tips to follow:

- Check for frayed or broken wires and loose connections, on the light sets, and replace non-working bulbs.
- Candles should never be used to decorate a tree.
- Live trees should be fresh, and can be sprayed with a Fire Marshal-approved flame-retardant chemical. They should also be watered regularly, without letting the tree holder become dry.
- Trees should never be placed near open flames, room exits, or heating sources.
- Electrical decorations and lights should not be within children's reach.
- Christmas lights should always be unplugged prior to leaving home or going to bed.
- Trees (and gift wrapping) should not be burned in a wood stove or fire place.

County Property Now Smoke-Free

All Tompkins County facilities and property, whether owned or leased, became smoke-free, as of November 1.

Administrative Policy No. 1-23, revised and approved by the Legislature in September, recognizes the County's commitment to the health and safety of all employees and consumers, and to providing full access to all facilities for everyone who uses or provides our public services.

The policy contains the following definitions:

Smoking – the smoking, burning, heating or use of cigarettes, cigars, pipes or other items that mimic these tobacco products or their likeness, including but not limited to hookahs, vapor cigarettes, and electronic cigarettes (“e-cigarettes”), will be prohibited in facilities, vehicles, equipment, or the property of Tompkins County, leased or owned. In addition, the use of nicotine delivery devices or products not approved for cessation by the FDA is also prohibited.

Facilities and Property – Tompkins County buildings, parking lots, entrance lanes and sidewalks, structures, county-owned vehicles or privately-owned vehicles parked on county property, and landscaped areas.

Persons – Tompkins County employees, clients, visitors, contractors, and the general public.

Why is *all* county property smoke-free?

Even outdoors, tobacco smoke is dangerous! Someone with asthma, heart disease, or other conditions must *stay away* from tobacco smoke. Entrances or walkways are not accessible if people may be smoking nearby.

There is no safe level of exposure to secondhand smoke, according to the U.S. Surgeon General.

- The whole property is smoke-free so there are no distances to measure and it's easy to know where smoking is not allowed.
- Even brief exposure to secondhand tobacco smoke can cause asthma attacks, and small amounts of secondhand tobacco smoke can cause a heart attack.
- Air near an outdoor smoker can be 50X more toxic than surrounding air.
- Tobacco smoke is more harmful than exhaust from a modern diesel engine.
- When kids learn that secondhand smoke is a danger to others, they are less likely to try smoking.



Smoke-free outdoor areas are becoming more and more common in Tompkins County and across New York State. Over time, smoke-free public areas will be part of enjoying everyday life both outdoors and in. Thank You for supporting this important step for a healthier community! Please encourage others to support it, too.

Make a plan to Quit today!

Smoking is an addiction. If you want to quit, it's best to make a plan. Here are some tips:

- **Set** a “Quit Date”, the day you plan to stop smoking forever. Pick a date in the next 1–2 weeks.
- **Get** information about nicotine replacements such as patches or gum to help with nicotine cravings.
- **Know** when, where and why you smoke. If you know the places and activities that trigger your urge to smoke, you can plan for ways to avoid them.
- **Learn** how to live as a non-smoker. As an ex-smoker you'll face a lot of changes. That takes preparation and practice.

Airport Sustainable Master Plan Receives National “Airports Going Green” Award

Ithaca Tompkins Regional Airport has been recognized with a prestigious national award for its Sustainable Master Plan—a recipient of the 2011 “Airports Going Green” (ASG) award, presented October 31, at the fourth annual Airports Going Green Conference in Chicago, IL.

Announcing the award, Chicago’s Deputy Commissioner of Aviation for Sustainability, Amy Malick, noted that the award recognizes the value of the Ithaca Airport Sustainable Master Plan as an important and ground-breaking project, as well as the Airport’s “outstanding leadership in pursuit of sustainability within the aviation industry.”

“I am delighted to receive this award and happy to play a part in the Sustainable Master Plan initiative,” says Airport Manager Bob Nicholas. “As the first of its kind, I believe it deserves this kind of recognition, particularly since it has led to a pilot program involving many other airports, and is likely to be the way airport master plans are done from this point on. Charlie McDermott of C&S Companies, the airport’s Syracuse-based consultants, should be singled out for his inspired insight in seeing the possibilities.”

Happy Holidays, From the ReBusiness Team!



Is Your Ride a Variety Package?

Do you have more than one ride or way to get to where you need to go? For those unpredictable times when your main way of getting around is not working, that is the time when you will want to be able to use another transportation choice that you already know will work for you.

For example, the public bus system is not operating that day due to the holiday schedule or bad roads and you need to get out despite this lack of bus service. Or it could be that your reliable car, or that of your friend who is giving you a ride, will not be working starting today. Or another frequent transportation problem in this area is a damaged car from a deer collision.



So if these concerns seem familiar to you and you would like to figure out one or several other means of getting to your destination(s), there are options to consider. And if one means of travel can only cover part of your ride needs, could you use several transportation choices to completely meet your ride needs?

Here are some possible ideas for your transportation variety package:

Zimride.com/Tompkins is a ridesharing website which helps a rider to share driving costs of trips whether you are looking to find a ride or to give a ride. Everyone within Tompkins County and people coming into Tompkins County for work can use it to expand their ridesharing search beyond their neighbors, friends, and coworkers. See www.zimride.com/Tomp

You set the price of the ride in your Zimride registration if you are the driver. The registration process will take five minutes to complete and will quickly provide you with a look at others interested in ridesharing within your target area and scheduled time. The site specifically helps find rides which either begin in Tompkins County with a destination out of the county, or start outside of Tompkins County and come into Tompkins County, or is a ride which is completely within the boundaries of Tompkins County. Zimride has been active in Tompkins County since March 2011 with over 320 registered Zim users on the County portal and there are three additional portals within the site for Cornell University, Ithaca College, and Tompkins Cortland Community College staff, faculty, and students.

VPSI Vanpooling is a way to share the cost of going to work in a van with a minimum group size of five people. Costs range depending upon the number of persons in the Vanpool group and the mileage traveled. The service is purchased with a one month contract which assures that you will get excellent service and only use this option if it works for you and the others in the group. Examples of VPSI Vanpool in use are the two Vanpools operating that start in Watkins Glen, with work destination in Tompkins County. These two vanpools came out of the end of the bus service to Watkins Glen, and riders were looking for other options to get to work. Way2Go Recognized by the EMC

The annual Tompkins County Environmental Management Council (EMC) Transportation Initiative of the Year (TIY) Award was recently presented for 2011 to Way2Go, a Cornell Cooperative Extension county-wide transportation education program.

The EMC's TIY Award recognizes programs and organizations that make a difference for the environment, and serve as a needed, progressive component of Tompkins County's transportation portfolio.

If you see that ridesharing or vanpooling may be a means of most of your transportation needs, would putting another ride option in your transportation package complete the total ride for you? Example, could you use ridesharing to get to the bus stop and then add a Just in Case **Ithacacarshare** membership at the low membership cost of \$50.00 per year for occasional use of a car in Ithaca? Check out more on Ithacacarshare at www.ithacacarshare.org or call 277-3210. The membership would allow you to reserve a car, pay mileage and hourly rate per time used, and give you a means to get to the doctor's appointment that is off the bus route or won't work for your schedule to go by bus. Would your options be more flexible with several bus passes or taxi credit in your wallet? (Check out different possibilities with Collegetown Cab at 607-588-8888 or www.collegetowncab.com and Ithaca Dispatch at 277-2842, or www.ithacataxi.biz/cabcash/cabcash_info_1.html.)
