Population and Demographics

City of Ithaca Population, All Ages – 30,569

City of Ithaca is the most populous of Tompkins County municipalities. Population increased 1.8% since 2010.

C. Ithaca's 0-17 youth population declined 8.7% since 2010. 15.8% of Tompkins youth ages 0-17 reside in C. Ithaca.

C. Ithaca's 0-20 youth population increased 10.6% since 2010. 32.2% of Tompkins youth ages 0-20 reside in C. Ithaca.







^{*}A Person in Need of Supervision (PINS) is a youth under the age of eighteen who is showing a pattern of habitual disobedience, running away, curfew violations, substance abuse, violent behavior, or school truancy problems. Pre-PINS Diversion Services attempt to resolve the conflicts that brought a youth to the attention of the Probation Department by offering supervision, guidance, and referrals to community resources, thus preventing the need for formal Family Court intervention. Pre-PINS Diversion is a mandatory prerequisite prior to filing a formal PINS petition in Family Court.
