Dear Chairman John:

Thank you for your recent correspondence from the Tompkins County Ethics Advisory Board. Please note below your questions restated in Bold and Park Foundation responses to each inquiry:

#### 1. What is the charitable purpose of the Foundation?

The Foundation is a nonprofit corporation organized exclusively for charitable, scientific, religious, literary or educational purposes within the meaning of Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code: to conduct and sponsor educational and instructional activities; to make grants and awards to individuals and organizations for charitable, educational, scientific, religious, or literary purposes; to prevent cruelty to children or animals; and to engage in any lawful acts or activities related to the foregoing which are consistent with the provisions of Section 501(c)(3) of the Code.

2. Prior to June 2020, had the Foundation ever awarded, contributed, donated, endowed, funded, granted, or provided any financial support to the City of Ithaca? If so, please provide the dates of the award, contribution, funding or financial support and purpose thereof.

### Answer to 4 & 5:

Park Foundation met (often virtually due to the pandemic) with several City employees during this period on an array of topics.

To the best of our knowledge, City employees Park Foundation met with between June 2020 and May 2022 include: Hon. Svante Myrick, Former Mayor; Hon. Laura Lewis, Acting Mayor; Luis Aguirre-Torres, Sustainability Director; Elizabeth Klohmann, Director, Ithaca Youth Bureau; Schelley Michell Nunn, Director of Human Resources; Lisa Nicholas, Acting Planning Director; Leslyn Mcbean-Clairborne, GIAC Director, City of Ithaca; Aniza Mendizabal, Community Development Planner, Ithaca Urban Renewal Agency; Nick Goldsmith, Sustainability Coordinator/Planner, City/town of Ithaca; Roxy Johnston, City of Ithaca Water Department.

Meetings with the former Mayor and current Acting Mayor were initiated by Park Foundation as an opportunity to meet me as the newly hired Park Executive Director. I joined Park Foundation in November of 2020. When the City Sustainability Director was hired in March 2021, Park Foundation also reached out to welcome him and connect.

Considering the range of programs we support (Excel Chart 1&2), and the frequency of interaction with the mosaic of city and community partners and grantees we engage with on a regular basis, we do not specifically track who initiates contact. Beyond a series of meet and greets scheduled with the new Executive Director, we do not generally note if meetings are educational in nature or specific to a particular program. We often ask about current work,

trends, and how we can help or partner with them. If a grant proposal is received, it is then reviewed and considered by the Foundation Trustees. Many of the meetings in this time frame are related to ongoing support reflected in attached Charts. Park Foundation does not share our prospective or current grantee applications or related documents. As the guidelines on our website clearly state: "Park Foundation considers proposals a confidential communication..." Between June 2020 and May 2022, numerous meetings occurred with a variety of city officials on many different topics.

## 6. All amounts awarded, contributed, donated, endowed, funded or granted to the City of Ithaca or any City program between June 2020 and March 2022.

7. Were there any terms, conditions, contingencies, limitations, prerequisites, or restrictions on the use of any award, contribution, donation, endowment, grant or other funding provided by the Foundation to the City? If so, please describe.

As required by Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, all support provided to grantees by the Foundation is solely for educational, scientific, or charitable purposes. Each grant is restricted to its purpose and may be modified only with the Foundation's advance approval.

No grant funds may be used for purposes of influencing elections or conducting voter registration drives, and no grant funds have been earmarked for either of those purposes. No grantee can expend any part of the grant in any way that violates federal or state law or subjects the Foundation to any penalty or loss of tax-exempt status under the federal tax law or other laws governing the use of charitable funds. If this is a project grant, no portion of the Foundation's grant funds may be used for the purpose of influencing legislation. If this is a general support or operating support grant, the IRS limitations on expenditures for the purpose of influencing legislation apply.

# 8. Please provide any other information or materials you believe would assist the board in its investigation.

Much of the information appearing in public on this matter has focused on the process concerning formation of the working group and public participation in the Re-Imagining process conducted in Ithaca.

As you are aware, the impetus for this process originated from Executive Order 203 from former NYS Governor Andrew Cuomo requiring local governments across NYS to undertake a comprehensive review of strategies, policies and practices relating to policing "for purposes of addressing the particular needs of the communities served by such police agency and promote community engagement to foster trust, fairness and legitimacy, and to address any racial bias and disproportionate policing of communities of color (E.O. 203)." Park Foundation made no grants to the City for this effort. We did provide grant funds to the Center for Transformative Action (CTA), the fiscal sponsor for the Dorothy Cotton Institute (DCI), for project support after receiving a grant proposal that focused on ensuring that input of those directly impacted by the Re-Imagining process would be included in the planning per the governor's executive order. The purpose for our support to CTA was to help ensure that communities often left out and underrepresented as emphasized by the Governor were not left out in this process. While providing stipends to participants in projects like this is considered a best practice, Park Foundation did not provide stipends to particular people engaged in the Re-Imagining process. No one at the Park Foundation had any part in selecting the participants or in providing any input in the process. Our grant funds were intended to provide operating support that would enable some compensation to be paid to participants and thereby encourage full community participation. We trust this added value to the plan.
