Call to Order/Breakout Rooms – Chair Cait Darfler called the meeting to order at 4:04pm. Members participated in breakout rooms, where they shared what small things in their lives were making them smile. Responses included connecting with people during difficult times, pets providing comfort on gray days, and vivid storytelling dreams.

Agenda Review/Public Comment – No changes were made to the agenda. Cait introduced guest Pete Loucks, a retired Cornell environmental engineer from the Town of Ithaca, who expressed interest in possibly joining the EMC.

Approval of Minutes – The September and October 2025 draft minutes were approved (motion by Susan Riley, second by Tom Hirasuna) as submitted. Motion carried. =

Action: Establish a Nominating Committee

Steve Nicholson made a motion, which Peter McDonald seconded, to establish a nominating committee to elect a chair and three vice chairs at December's meeting. The committee will include Steve N. as chair, along with Christine Collins, Elaine Tietjen, and Barry Siebe. Motion carried.

Action: Vote to Recommend At-Large Members for Reappointment

Steve Bissen made a motion, seconded by Barry Siebe, to recommend Cait Darfler and Dan Antonioli for reappointment as at-large members. Motion carried.

Executive Committee Report: Biosolids/Lansing Moratorium

Cait reported that biosolids work has dominated her time recently. She presented at PEEQ on Monday alongside Cynthia Brock (Water Resources Council), Leo Riley (Recycling & Materials Management), and Maury Josephson (County Attorney). The EMC had passed a biosolids resolution, but when state bills were modified to remove key provisions, Cait rewrote the resolution for the PEEQ version to specifically

call out these missing provisions. The revised resolution passed PEEQ unanimously and will go to the Legislature on Tuesday at 5:30pm. The Ag and Farmland Protection Bureau also passed a similar resolution, and an interdepartmental working group will be formed to examine County actions, particularly around hauler permitting. Annie Koreman thanked Cait and others for their extensive work navigating the complex process. Discussion covered the Lansing moratorium, with Siobhan Hull reporting on the town board's back-and-forth and Ed Dubovi explaining concerns about TeraWulf's aggressive tactics including legal proceedings and complex LLC structures. Peter McDonald noted 1,500 letters submitted against the project and harassment of residents and elected officials. Barry Siebe raised concerns about power consumption and grid weakness, while Kathleen Yen suggested focusing a potential EMC letter on fiscal and infrastructure constraints.

Presentation/Discussion: Draft Structure Proposal – Cait shared a comprehensive slideshow outlining the EMC's strategic structure moving forward, emphasizing that in Tompkins County's crowded environmental landscape, the EMC's unique advantage is its direct relationship with the County Legislature and cross-county municipal network, positioning it as an environmental information hub. The proposed structure includes two standing committees (Community Outreach and Legislative Affairs) and two working groups (EMC Member Engagement and Unique Natural Areas), with all voting members expected to participate in either a committee or working group. Legislative Affairs year one tasks could include attending PEEQ meetings, researching state bills, and building tracking systems, while Community Outreach priorities could include continuing the Green Scene e-newsletter, identifying annual tabling events, deepening partnerships, and potentially one new initiative. Cait stressed the need to recruit more members to fill open seats, noting that more members means less burnout and increased capacity. Peter praised the vision and mentioned partnership opportunities with Sustainable Finger Lakes, while Elaine shared the idea of creating new programs, such as connecting graduate students to high schools. The group discussed committee accountability to the full EMC and agreed to continue discussions in December before voting on leadership. January will feature an in-person organizational meeting where committees will develop 2026 work plans, while the December meeting will remain virtual.

Legislative Liaison Update (*as needed*) – Annie Koreman reported she had no major updates and noted that the December meeting would be her last as County legislator.

Staff Report (*as needed*) – No report was given.

Member Updates – Members reported on the Town of Dryden's memorial planting for Bob Beck, Danby's Conservation Advisory Council presentation on bird banding, Climate Reality Finger Lakes activities Village of Lansing's hyacinth plantings and new park plaque, Cayuga Lake Watershed Intermunicipal Organization's drinking water protection plan update, winter stormwater training sessions, and the Water Resources Council's draft TMDL fact sheet for municipalities.

Adjournment – Vice Chair Susan Riley adjourned the meeting at 5:26pm.
