Dear Tompkins County Community,

On behalf of your Sheriff's Office, I would like to extend my heartfelt thanks for an outstanding 2024. It has been our pleasure and privilege to serve you. I am immensely proud of our team and the incredible work they've accomplished throughout the year. Our commitment remains strong—to continuously improve our operations in service of the community we are honored to protect.

One of our proudest achievements in 2024 was earning New York State Accreditation for our Law Enforcement Division for the first time in our agency's history. This voluntary accreditation, overseen by the NYS Division of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS), required us to meet 112 rigorous standards grounded in best-known practices. The process involved a comprehensive review of our policies, extensive training, and a multi-day site assessment. Our policies are now publicly available on our website, reinforcing our commitment to transparency. A special thank you goes to Undersheriff Olin, who served as our Accreditation Manager and was instrumental in achieving this milestone.

We also advanced our Transparency Hub—an important resource on our website that provides the community with access to data on our daily operations. This includes information about our Crisis Alternative Response & Engagement (CARE) Teams, Civilian Response Unit, Use of Force statistics, Traffic Enforcement Activities, and the STOP DWI program. In 2025, we will continue expanding the hub with additional dashboards for arrests, incident data, and Corrections Division statistics.

Our CARE Team initiative continues to be a model of compassionate, effective public safety. This program pairs a seasoned deputy sheriff with a mental health professional to respond to individuals in crisis with empathy and the goal of connecting them with the proper resources—often preventing unnecessary entry into the criminal justice system. Thanks to its success, we proudly added a second CARE Team in 2024.

We also experienced a bittersweet moment as we bid farewell to Captain Raymond Bunce, who retired after years of dedicated service as our Jail Administrator. Captain Bunce brought a high level of professionalism and care to our Correction's Division. Though he will be missed, Captain Lauran Harrison, who came to us from Stueben County, has stepped up to fill this role. She has already done an outstanding job!

General Order 100: Mission

Mission Statement

"Honor, Pride, Integrity"

Our motto is more than just a saying These words describe how we have decided to represent ourselves In the performance of our duties. These words hold so much value to us That we have chosen to wear them on our sleeve. They provide reassurance to those that come into our presence, and serve as a constant reminder for us.

Honor involves loyalty to our agency, and to the public we have been called to protect.

It requires a servant's humility and a just and merciful heart.

It is being self-sacrificial rather than self-serving.

It involves an unrelenting commitment to excellence.

Pride describes a feeling that comes from our sense of duty. It does now represent a feeling of self-righteousness or superiority. Rather, it comes from the recognition of the utter importance of our purpose and respect for the authority bestowed upon us. It grows over time as a result of shared experience and trust.

> Integrity is what we are expected to possess. It involves living by a higher standard. It is holding us accountable to each other and to the public. It comes from being guided not only by what is legal, but what is moral, right, and just.

General Order 100: Mission

The role of the Tompkins County Sheriff's Office in providing effective law enforcement services to the community includes the following:

- ⇒ <u>Community Partnership</u>—Crime is a problem that affects all segments of our society, and is a concern of everyone. The Sheriff's Office shall endeavor to involve the community in generating mutual understanding regarding the nature and extent of the crime problem and to involve the community in crime prevention efforts necessary to reduce crime and improve the quality of life. This police-community partnership will enhance the overall success of the Sheriff's Office efforts.
- ⇒ Deterrence of Crime—Although there are certain crimes that cannot be prevented, crimes committed against innocent victims in public places and crimes against property can be deterred by proactive police patrol and involved citizenry. These types of crimes are deterred by the criminal's fear of immediate apprehension or by the increased likelihood of his/her detection. The deterrence of crime requires the investigation of behavior that appears to be criminally directed. The Sheriff's Office shall strive to deploy its patrol forces so as to deter crime and inspire public confidence in its ability to ensure a peaceful environment.
- ⇒ Apprehension of Offenders—Once a crime has been committed, it is the duty of the Sheriff's Office to initiate the criminal justice process by identifying and apprehending the offender, obtaining necessary evidence and by assisting in the prosecution of the case. The Sheriff's Office must strive diligently to solve all crimes and to bring offenders to justice.
- ⇒ <u>Victim/Witness Assistance</u> It is essential to our law enforcement efforts that we protect the rights of victims and witnesses. Therefore, the Sheriff's Office shall strive to avoid the traumatization of victim/witnesses by assisting them through an awareness of the psychological trauma associated with their circumstances and providing them with the necessary information regarding resources that are available to them.
- ⇒ <u>Recovery and Return of Property</u>—While the actual cost of crime is difficult to measure, it is possible to observe the steadily mounting cost of lost and stolen property. This loss, as well as the other costs must be borne ultimately by victims. In order to minimize the losses due to crime, the Sheriff's Office shall make every reasonable effort to recover lost or stolen property, to identify its owners, and to ensure its prompt return.
- ⇒ <u>Public Service</u>—Because other public or private agencies may be unavailable, the public relies upon the police for assistance and advice in both routine and emergency situations. Saving lives, aiding the injured, locating lost persons, keeping the peace and providing for many other miscellaneous needs are basic services provided by the Sheriff's Office. It is the Sheriff's Office's responsibility to respond to calls for service and to render such aid or advice, as is necessitated or indicated by the situation.
- ⇒ Enhancement of Quality of Life—In addition to dealing with crime, the Sheriff's Office recognizes that it is in a position to address issues impacting the quality of life in the community. Therefore, the Sheriff's Office will seek to proactively identify property or locations within the county which are subject to chronic or persistent illegal activity, or which are the source of nuisance or unsafe conditions. The Sheriff's Office will utilize available resources, including referral to and cooperation with other agencies, to improve such conditions.
- ⇒ Fair and Equitable Treatment of All Persons—The Sheriff's Office recognizes its obligation to conduct its activities and treat all persons in a lawful, fair, equitable, and evenhanded manner without regard to race, color, national or ethnic origin, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, religion, disability, political affiliation, or personal interest.

2024 Goals & Objectives

Law Enforcement Accreditation Program

⇒ This goal took us several years to complete and was finalized in 2024. All accreditation standards were met, and our assessment was completed. For the first time in TCSO history, we have earned this credential. We are the only municipal law enforcement agency in Tompkins County to have this. Additionally, our Corrections Division was re-accredited.

Gun Involved Violence Elimination (GIVE) Grant

⇒ Although the Ithaca Police Department is currently managing this grant, we had a huge success when we managed it in their place. We are continuing to work with Flock Safety on the implementation of plate reader cameras in the county. Those in the City of Ithaca funded through our efforts (to include gunshot detection devices) have been mostly installed.

Corrections Division Succession Planning

⇒ We saw the retirement of Corrections Captain Ray Bunce and successfully recruited Captain Harrison from Steuben County. The two worked together for several months to ensure a smooth transition. We added a Corrections Lieutenant position and promoted Sergeant Seth Case to the position.

Revitalize the Jail Garden Program

⇒ After a state of decline due to COVID-19, staff worked alongside URO to restart the jail garden in 2024.

Implementation of a Body Worn Camera Program in the Jail

⇒ Policy was developed and funds were obtained from the legislature to expand this program in Corrections

Creation of a Sheriff's Office Transparency Hub

- ⇒ This is an ongoing effort that is nearly complete. The hub can be viewed at our agency website
- ⇒ In 2024, we created the hub and successfully created portals for the Crisis Alternative Response & Engagement Team (CARE), Civilian Response Unit, Defensive Action Reports, Traffic Stops & Tickets, and STOP DWI. We continue to move forward with portals for Arrests, Incidents, and Jail Statistics.

Comprehensive Recruitment & Retention Standards

⇒ Although recruitment is not what it was in the past, we have successfully maintained staffing levels while other agencies have suffered. Officer Wellness policy and programs were implemented.

New York State Law Enforcement Accreditation



On September 12, 2024, Sheriff Osborne, Undersheriff Olin, and Lieutenant Koskinen were invited to the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services in Albany, New York where they were presented a Certificate of Accreditation for the Tompkins County Sheriff's Office Law Enforcement Division. The certificate reads:

"The Tompkins County Sheriff's Office has demonstrated a high level of excellence and professionalism in the field of law enforcement by meeting the standards established by the New York State Law Enforcement Accreditation Council."

Only 1/3 of law enforcement agencies in New York State possess this credential and the Sheriff's Office is the only municipal agency in Tompkins County to have it. The accreditation is good through September 11, 2029. Sheriff Osborne stated:

"Accreditation has been the goal of our administration for the past 6 years, achieving it is a testament to our commitment to serve our community to the best of our ability."

Sheriff Osborne would like to give credit to Undersheriff Olin who served as the program manager during the process and was instrumental in achieving this for this office. The Tompkins County Sheriff's Office is at the forefront of transparency, placing internal policies on its website, a means for the community to provide input or suggestions on them, as well as a transparency hub that provides the community with statistics regarding law enforcement activities. The Corrections Division also received re-accreditation recently through a program established by the New York State Sheriff's Association.

The Law Enforcement Agency Accreditation Program is a voluntary program designed to improve an agency's effectiveness, efficiency and professionalism, promote training, and foster public confidence in law enforcement. Police departments and sheriff's offices are eligible to participate in the program. Participating agencies must meet standards in three categories: Administration, Training, and Operations. Accreditation provides formal recognition that an agency meets or exceeds expectations of quality; demonstrates that the agency performs professionally; has formalized policies in place to govern its operational practices and procedures; and that its employees contribute to the agency's mission and know what is expected of them.

The program as established 112 standards based on known best practices that an agency must meet. The process included three assessors who reviewed policies remotely, followed by an in-person three-day review at the sheriff's office. During the assessment, policies are reviewed, proofs that the policies are followed are examined, and employees are questioned for their knowledge of them.

On May 29, 2024, the Corrections Sergeants and Officers listed above were involved in an incident in which an incarcerated individual was having a medical emergency. The individual was having a seizure which progressed into losing consciousness, becoming unresponsive, and losing a pulse. Officers maintained CPR for 10 minutes until medical professionals arrived and were able to regain a pulse and transport the individual to a hospital for further care. The extraordinary actions from these officers saved the life of a person who would have likely died if not for their actions.

Jail Gardening Program— TCSO partnered with Ultimate Reentry Opportunity of Tompkins County to revitalize the jail garden program. The intent of this program is to teach our incarcerated population to raise crops on a small scale. When they are released, they will have the ability to grow their own food. This program also provides the opportunity to be involved in something they can take personal pride in and a feeling of accomplishment. The food grown is utilized by the kitchen during meal preparation and also donated to local food pantries.

Administrative Division

The Administrative Division is made up of one Lieutenant, one Civil Deputy, and three Civil Account Permit Clerks. This division processes pistol permit applications, maintains records and reports all crime statistics to New York State, and enforces court decisions by serving warrants, orders of protection, evictions, and other civil matters.

Criminal Investigations Division

The Criminal Investigations Division is made up of one Lieutenant and four Investigators who are responsible for investigating felony-level crimes. In addition, they also collect and transport disposed medications from the drop-off bin located in the Public Safety Building lobby. Too often, unused prescription drugs find their way into the wrong hands. Drug Take Back days are held throughout the year to help dispose of unused/unwanted prescription medications. These events are posted on our Tompkins County Sheriff's Office Facebook Page.

Road Patrol Division

The Sheriff's Office maintains a map of Tompkins County organized into distinct and identifiable patrol areas . A patrol map (shown below) was created by organizing the county into four designated zones. The zones are referred to as 325, 326, 327, and 328. Their boundaries are described as:

- 325 Zone = That geographic area bordered on the north by the Cayuga County line, on the east by the Cortland County line, and on the south by a line from the Cortland County line to Route 34B westward to Scofield Road, then in a southerly direction to an area south of Route 13, then west to the area of Scofield Road, then south along the Cayuga Heights boundary, then west to eh City of Ithaca boundary, then north along Route 13 and north along a line in the center of Cayuga Lake and Cayuga County.
- 326 Zone = That geographic area whose eastern border is the Cortland County line, with a northern border from the Cortland county line to Route 34B and west to Scofield Road. South along Scofield Road to the Cayuga Heights boundary then southwest to the City of Ithaca boundary. From the city boundary then southeast along Coddington Road continued southeast through portions of the Town of Ithaca, Danby and Caroline, north of Coddington Road to the Tioga County line.



- 327 Zone = That geographic area whose northeastern border consists of portions of the Town of Ithaca, Town of Danby, Town of Caroline west of Coddington Road East and that portion of the Town of Newfield east of Route 13.
- 328 Zone = That geographic area defined on the southern border as Route
 13 South, to City of Ithaca boundary,
 and north along the center of Cayuga
 Lake to Cayuga County, and bordered
 on the north and west by the Counties
 of Cayuga, Seneca, and Schuyler.

Statistics—Use of Force & Show of Force

In compliance with applicable law, the Tompkins County Sheriff's Office shall use only the amount of force necessary and reasonable to accomplish lawful objectives and to control a situation, effect an arrest, overcome resistant to arrest or defend themselves or others from harm. When force is necessary, the degree of force employed should be in direct relationships to the amount of resistance exerted, or the immediate threat to the officer or others. (G.O. 900 Use of Force).

The Tompkins County Sheriff's Office has a module on the Transparency hub for Use of Force and Show of Force statistics. This reporting system allows for the effective review and analysis of all Office use of force/show of force incidents. This system identifies trends, helps to improve officers training and safe-ty, and provide timely and accurate information to the Office. Whenever a use of force/show of force is used against a subject (above un-resisted handcuffing), Officers shall complete the appropriate Office Defensive Action Report. This includes display of and/or use of OC spray, impact weapon, taser, firearm, or any action that results in or is alleged to have resulted in, injury to or the death of another person.

Statistics— Vehicle & Traffic Stops

The Sheriff's Office utilizes the New York State TraCS application to record, retrieve, and transfer traffic safety-related data. This data is extracted from mandatory fields on the uniform traffic ticket within the TraCS database. It's important to note that a New York State driver's license does not include a race identifier, and the NYS TraCS application does not require that the race field be completed for validation purposes. Consequently, an operator's race cannot be accurately collected at this time.

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Statistics—CARE TEAM



The Crisis Alternative Response and Engagement Team's primary purpose is to provide comprehensive mental health services to persons in mental, behavioral or emotional crisis. In 2024, a second CARE Team was added at TCSO. The goals of these units are to match mental health services to a person in crisis by offering alternatives to emergency petitions, when justified by clinical assessment, increase access to mental health system resources, increase knowledge/access to community services, divert community members from the criminal justice system when mental/behavioral health issues are the driving force of their actions and reduce the patrol officer's time in handling such individuals.



Statistics— Civilian Response

The purpose of the Civilian Response unit is to respond to certain non-emergency calls for service with unarmed Sheriff's Clerks, telephonically or in-house, that do not require an armed response. This frees up time for Deputy Sheriffs to respond to emergency calls, complete investigations, and build more relationships with members of the community. Calls handled by this unit include Traffic Issues/Complaints, Property Complaints, Vacant Property Check Requests, Fraud/Telephone Scams, Larceny/Thefts with no



The Sheriff also designated Sheriff's Clerk Sam Pulliam to manage the Office's Sex Offender Program in addition to other duties. On average, there are 180 registered sex offenders residing or employed in Tompkins County at any one time. Sam manages the office's compliance with the registration and address verification portions of the NYS Sex Offender Registration Act and Sheriff's Office General Order 505 Sex Offender Registration Act.

In 2024, Sam completed 65 Sex Offender Changes of Address and had 116 visits from Level 3 Offenders due to their regulation to check in every 90 days.

Statistics— Special Traffic Options Program for Driving While Impaired (STOP-DWI)

The STOP-DWI program was created by the State Legislature in 1981 in order to empower counties to coordinate local efforts to reduce alcohol and other drug-related traffic crashes. The program functions as a financially self-sustaining alcohol and highway safety program and is funded entirely from fines paid by convicted drunken drivers, no tax dollars are used.

The NYS STOP-DWI Mission

- \Rightarrow Reduce the number of persons killed or injured in alcohol and other drug-related traffic crashes
- \Rightarrow To promote DWI prevention as a public priority
- ⇒ Coordinate local efforts in Law Enforcement, Prosecution, Probation, Rehabilitation, Public Information, Education, and Administration

While STOP-DWI efforts across New York have led to significant reductions in the numbers of alcohol and drug related fatalities, still too many lives are being lost because of crashes caused by drunk or impaired drivers. Highly visible, highly publicized efforts like the STOP-DWI High Visibility Engagement Campaign aim to further reduce the incidence of drunk and impaired driving. Research shows that high visibility enforcement can reduce drunk driving fatalities by as much as 20 percent. Sobriety checkpoints and roving patrols play a key part in raising awareness about the problem.

The High Visibility Engagement Campaigns are locally driven programs. STOP-DWI coordinators work with their municipal, county sheriff and state police agencies to coordinate enforcement activities while distributing and posting educational materials to the public. Local participating police agencies include the Tompkins County Sheriff's Office, City of Ithaca Police Department, Village of Dryden Police Department, Village of Cayuga Heights Police Department, Village of Trumansburg Police Department, and the Village of Groton Police Department.

Statistics – DWI Crashes in Tompkins County 2020-2024

Between January 1, 2020 and December 31, 2024, there were a total of 282 alcohol- and drug-related crashes in Tompkins County. The highest number of DWI crashes occurred in 2022, with 65 crashes occurring that year. In 2024, the total number of DWI crashes was about 21% lower than in 2023, however the 2024 data is still preliminary and could change as crash reports are populated in the system. The average number of DWI crashes per year in Tompkins County during this timeframe was 56.

DWI crashes in Tompkins County between 2020 and 2024 could primarily be attributed to alcohol (50%) and drugs (7%); however, speeding (9%), failure to keep right (7%), and improper lane use (5%) were also top contributing factors to these crashes.

Between 2020 and 2024, a total of 1,278 impaired tickets were written in Tompkins County. The majority were alcohol-related. Most of these tickets were written in the City of Ithaca (22%), the Town of Dryden (14%), and the Town of Ithaca (14%). County issued impaired tickets were slightly higher than State Police while local agencies issued the least.

Countywide Crashes



Between 2020 and 2024, the average number of crashes per year in Tompkins County was 2,561. The average number of fatal crashes was 6, and the average number of personal injury crashes was 319. These fatal and PI crashes resulted in a total of 32 deaths and 1,980 injuries over the course of the last five years in Tompkins County.

Training—Firearms, Taser, & Less-Lethal Devices





Spring & Fall Firearms

Held bi-annually by TCSO Firearm Instructors for all in-house Law Enforcement Officers. Training covers policy/procedure review, live-fire courses in the daytime and nighttime, qualification courses, reality-based training, and new techniques.



Taser

Held annually to ensure that TCSO Deputies receive a refresher course every year. Training includes Case Law, Use of Force, Show of Force, live-fire, and reality-based scenarios.









Less-Lethal Devices

The purpose of using less-lethal devices is to minimize risk of death or serious injury when deployed. TCSO not only uses tasers as less-lethal options but also shot-guns with bean bag rounds and OC spray. Bean bag rounds are shotgun-fired projectiles filled with small lead pellets or fabric bags. OC Spray is a widely used less-lethal option that irritates the eyes and skin, temporarily incapacitating individuals.

Training—FBINAA Leadership Certification Program



The FBI National Academy Associates, Inc. (FBINAA) is a non-profit, international organization of 14,000+ senior law enforcement professionals dedicated to providing our communities, states, countries, and profession with the highest degree of law enforcement expertise, training, education, and information.

In 2024, Lieutenant Koskinen attended and successfully completed the FBINAA Leadership Certification Program. Captain Harrison also attended and successfully completed this training prior to transferring to our office. This program's purpose is to continue to develop the highest degree of law enforcement leaders across the country. The certification is a series of courses, open to all law enforcement professionals. It encompasses the latest strategies, techniques, and real-world leadership scenarios to prepare each participant to better lead their respective units, shifts, or agencies into the unpredictable future of law enforcement.

To complete this course, Lieutenant Koskinen and Captain Harrison had to complete the following:

- Course One: Leadership Foundation for Law Enforcement—From Self-Mastery to Team Success (4 day program)
- Course Two: Leadership Culture for Law Enforcement—Cultivating Organizational Excellence (2 day program)
- ♦ Course Three: Attend one of the FBINAA Leadership Forum Courses (2-3 day program)
- Complete a Self Study Research Paper—assigned by the FBINAA Education and Training Division

Special Programs

Project Lifesaver Program— The Project Lifesaver program consisted of 32 active clients in 2024. Of those clients, there were _____ wandering/ lost incidents of which 100% were successfully found with the help of this program.





Sheriff's Camp Program— The NYS Sheriff's Camp is for children 9-12 years of age who would not have an opportunity to attend summer camp due to economic reasons. It is fully funded by the New York State Sheriff's Association Institute so there is no cost for campers to attend. In 2024, TCSO had 4 campers attend.

Cops, Kids, & Toys Program — A community volunteer program designed to help families in need during the winter holidays. With the help of TCSO and other local agencies throughout the year, the program successfully served over 310 families with 756 children receiving toys in 2024.



Holiday Donations from TCSO — Under the Administration of Sheriff Osborne and Undersheriff Olin, TCSO began a new tradition in 2022. With the help of The Advocacy Center of Tompkins County, Tompkins County Department of Social Services, and community donations, members of TCSO create Easter baskets and Christmas stockings every year to donate to families being housed in our local shelters and safe houses. In 2024, TCSO donated over 42 Easter Baskets and over 35 Christmas stockings with 2 large bags of toys.







Bike Patrol Unit— Many community events throughout the year such as Grassroots are patrolled by the TCSO Bike Patrol Unit. We also teach bike safety and rules of the road at local school events like the Lansing Community Bike Derby.





Marine Patrol Unit — The Southern Eastern part of Cayuga Lake is currently patrolled by the TCSO Marine Patrol Unit. In 2024, TCSO spent 187 hours patrolling the lake from May 29th through September 30th.

UTV/Snowmobile Unit— New York finally got enough snow in the 2024 -2025 season so TCSO was able to put the brand new snowmobiles to work. With 325 hours on patrol, TCSO responded to 80 assists.





Airport Security — Providing airport security is a crucial role that TCSO plays for the Ithaca Tompkins Regional Airport. Having security along with TSA helps maintain a safe environment for travelers. In 2024, TCSO responded to 61 incidents.

Specialized Response Team — The Specialized Response Team consists of 15 members made up from both TCSO and IPD. In 2024, try-outs were successfully held to fill any open spots to fill the team. Congratulations to TCSO Deputy Rumsey to making the team! During the year, SRT was activated to respond to 12 incidents.



K9-1 — In 2024, K9 Laker and handler Deputy Montesano responded to 10 deployments and 21 special details. K9 Laker is certified by the National Narcotics Detector Dog Association, Eastern Police Canine Association (Police Bomb Dog I), and NYS DCJS Certification all for explosive detection.

Gun Involved Violence Elimination (G.I.V.E.) Task Force— The Sheriff's Office created the GIVE Task Force in 2023 through the NYS Division of Criminal Justice Services GIVE X grant. The sole purpose of this program is to reduce shootings and firearm-related violent crime, including homicides. The goal was to focus on gun crime throughout the County, with a focus on the City of Ithaca. TCSO is proud of the partnership that was formed with the District Attorney's Office, Tompkins County Probation, Ithaca Police Department, NYS Parole, Southern Tier Crime Analysis Center, and others.

From the 2023-2024 grant year, the work of the task force resulted in 12 violations, 111 misdemeanors, and 50 felony charges. We removed 20 illegally possessed firearms from the streets, 7 other miscellaneous weapons, 365 grams of methamphetamine, 27 grams of heroin, 285 grams of cocaine, and thousands of dollars in suspected drug money.

The work of the task force has been hugely successful and has resulted in the diminishment of shots-fired complains, hampered illicit drug activity, and has made for a much safer community.

As of July 1, 2024, the Ithaca Police Department took the lead on this program.
