**Function:** To serve in an advisory capacity on issues relating to diversity and inclusion in employment and service within the Tompkins County work force; to encourage equality of treatment for and discourage discrimination in employment and customer service within Tompkins County, and to assist the Tompkins County Legislature in fulfilling the goals of the Diversity Policy Guidelines as adopted by Resolution No. 126 on July 18, 2006, and the Diversity and Inclusion plan.

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#### **Tompkins County Workforce Development Board**

Created pursuant to the Workforce Investment Act of 1998. Bylaws adopted via Res. 181 of 1999 and amended by Res. No. 98 of 2000 and Res. No. 294 of 2001; Local Law No. 1 of 2003; Local Law No. 1 of 2017; Res. 234 of 2004; and Res. No. 80 of 2007; Chair of the Tompkins County Legislature appoints all members. Seats are not limited to one representative. Majority shall represent private sector; staggered three-year terms.

Established by Res. No. 267 of 1976; Article 21 of the Tompkins County Charter and Code of 1970; membership increased and amended by Local Law No. 2 of 1993, Res. No. 27 of 2019; amended by Local Law No. 1 of 2003; Local Law No. 1 of 2017; bylaws amended via Res. Nos. 54 of 1988, 52 of 1993, 53 of 1993, 128 of 2003, 160 of 2018; 220 of 2024; three-year terms; 18 members.

Function: The Youth Services Board acts as a resource to municipalities in solving youth problems and enacting youth recreation and development programs.
