

THE STORY BEHIND THE DATA

GRAPH 1: # of youth served – We surpassed our annual target goal of 250 youth. 283 young people were provided with brief outreach services, 147% of the annual goal of 160. Additionally, 76 young people were involved in our intensive independent living program, 84% of our annual goal of 90. Twenty-two (22) young people were housed in our transitional living program year-to-date. Relocation to Founder's Way in '23 will provide enhanced offerings. The new Drop In Center will include new furnishings, a clothing closet, computer/internet access, private showers and a laundry facility for youth to use.

GRAPH 2: % of IL participants satisfied with program & services received (Youth survey, reported annually) - Participant satisfaction with Youth Outreach remains high. We collect Satisfaction Surveys throughout the program year and report on results at the close of the year. Knowledgeable and experienced staff, provision of independent living supplies, well trained and experienced staff, and additional funding for housing opportunities have all contributed to the high rates of satisfaction reported by Youth Outreach participants.

GRAPH 3: % of youth secured stabled housing for a 3-6 month period. - We are on target to meet and/or exceed the percentage of youth who secured stable housing for a three to six-month period with a 88% average. Additional funding, FUP housing vouchers for former foster care youth, and coordination with TC Action's Amici House and Corn Street housing, and the opening of Ithaca Arthaus and West End Heights have contributed to successful housing stability for youth in our program.
