NATIVE AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH

November is <u>National Native American Heritage Month</u>. Did you know that native people have the highest per-capita rate of military service than any other population demographic, and the

highest population concentration of women veterans? To get started with commemorating this in November, here are a few items of note:

- Register! Nov 4 VA WebEx on National Native American Veterans Memorial On November 4, 3PM ET, VA's Office of Tribal Government Relations is hosting a talk via WebEx with museum curators to discuss the National Native American Veterans Memorial, which will be unveiled in Washington, DC, this Veterans Day. Tune in!
- Seneca Nation WWII Veteran Inducted Into NYS Senate Veterans' Hall of Fame –
 Ralph Bowen served as an aerial gunner aboard a B-24 Liberator heavy bomber during
 WWII, helping to liberate France and Europe from Nazi occupation. Later in life, he
 served as a member of the Seneca Nation Tribal Council and other civic roles. Earlier
 this month he was inducted into the NYS Senate's Veterans' Hall of Fame.
- Shinnecock WWII Veteran Turns 103 Earlier this year, Lubin Walter Hunter greeted well-wishers in a drive-by parade honoring his 103rd birthday. Hunter was born on the Shinnecock Reservation in 1917 at a time when Native Americans were not acknowledged as U.S. citizens. His father had served in WWI, his citizenship being listed as "alien friendly to the United States."
- The Untold Story Of Indigenous Women And The Suffrage Movement Long before
 women gathered for the right to vote in Seneca Falls, women of the Haudenosaunee
 nations exercised social equality in civic roles. Akwesasne filmmaker Katsitsionni Fox
 has a newly released short film illuminating how Haudenosaunee women influenced
 New York's European-descended pioneers in women's rights. It will begin <u>airing next</u>
 week on PBS stations.
- Am I Using the Right Word? It's important to acknowledge the diversity of Indigenous Peoples' cultures, traditions, and languages throughout the Western Hemisphere. When discussing or working with a particular tribe or nation, learning and using accurate terms specific to the community can prevent stereotypes and encourage cultural understanding and sensitivity.
